A Voice Cries Out

Our speaker of the morning was our own EM-MANUEL HERNANDEZ. Emmanuel gave us an early Happy St. Patrick's Day and told that his daughter married an Irishman. He has now been a Kiwanian a year and is looking forward to many more.

Emmanuel spent some 34 years with the LAPD after being in the service and going through college. He worked many assignments but took this opportunity to talk of only one.

He was working homicide and received a call at about 1:00 AM. His supervisor wanted to know how he was doing and he admitted to being awake. He was told there had a been a murder at an area where gang members hang out resulting from a drive-by shooting. He asked his supervisor why he received the call and the reply was that he was the only one who answered the phone.

He was asked to go to the hospital where they had taken the victim and start the identification process. After that the next of kin would be identified. He went to the hospital and found the body of a fourteen year old African American who was still on the gurney with his chest cavity exposed. He had died as they tried to save him and once dead, he was left just in the condition he was at the time of his death.

As he began the process he thought of the body of the young boy who was now over to one side of the room awaiting the autopsy procedures. He thought of how this doesn't make any sense as he used a Polaroid camera to get a picture of the lad so that they could go up and down the street looking for someone who recognized him.

He recalled how many times he had witnessed the scene of a young person now dead and left in the corner of the room while the hospital personnel went to the next victim.

Armed with the Polaroid picture of the lad's face, he went to the street and began his search for identity. No one wanted to admit they knew who he was or anything about the shooting. Finally a young girl told him that a lady had been going up and down the street looking for her son who had disappeared. The young girl knew where the lady lived and pointed out the house. It was a neat and well kept house and his knock on the door was answered by a relative. Emmanuel asked to talk to the lady and was told she was still outside somewhere looking for her son. They sat on a plastic covered sofa and waited.

While he waited he thought of how similar this house was to the one in which he was brought up not so many blocks away

Finally she returned and seeing the police cars outside, she knew why they were there. She began screaming and repeating, "Tell me it's not true," Emmanuel had to tell her it was indeed true and the screams permeated the entire house. He tried to console her and even now the it hurts when he recalls it. He spoke to the step-father and told him the coroner would contact them. He left and as he drove down the street he rolled up the windows on that hot July night to try and shut out the screams.

As he drove away, two things came to mind. One was a story told him by his father about a foreign invading army thousands of years ago that brought the "voices crying out" and the "wailing of the people." The invaders are now drugs and gangs but they create the same wailing.

The second was that he was brought up in the same general type of neighborhood but that he became involved with those serving the community, particularly the YMCA and the outlet it offered for the youth. He took advantage of the athletic programs of the YMCA and grew up with a life filled with normalcy. For that he wanted to thank the service clubs such as Kiwanis for all they do to help the community. He says, we never know what kind of impact we have when we serve.


